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Our Program

Expanding Children's Hearing Opportunities (ECHO)

- Birth three services (home, daycare, or center)
- Pre-School third grade school program
- Listening and spoken language focused, but ALWAYS supporting parent choice





The Children We See

- Mostly white
- In 2-parent homes
- Low-mid socio economic status
- English language of the home
- 50% have experienced some early trauma, including medical trauma, that impacts caregiver availability, attachment, and engagement
- Currently 12% of El families, and 20% of school families have children who are adopted or being fostered

Adverse Childhood Experiences

Traumatic, stressful events experienced in childhood

Abuse

- Physical
- Emotional
- Sexual

Neglect

- Physical
- Emotional

Household Dysfunction

- Divorce
- Mother treated violently
- Incarcerated relative

- Substance abuse
- Mental illness

Impact of ACEs

- Difficulty with self-regulation
- Heightened and/or toxic stress
- Difficulty forming attachment and relationships
- Difficulty attending and learning

Long term impact includes greater risk for health issues, substance abuse, academic and employment outcomes, including early death.









HOW DO ACES IMPACT EI?








Parent Interviews


