Authorship

- Does the author have a connection to the Deaf community?
- Are they part of the community themselves?
- Did they work with members of the community during the writing process?



Community

- Do the characters have access to other Deaf peers?
- Do they have access to Deaf adults?
- Are the characters getting supports when they need them?



Diversity

- Are there different ways to be Deaf?
- Are Deaf folks shown using a variety of hearing technology, language modalities, and communication methods?
- Is there diversity of Deaf individuals and intersecting identities?



Deaf Experience

- Is the character fully developed with deafness as part of their life?
- Does their storyline include deafness without reducing the character to that one element?
- Is this accurate to Deaf lived experience?



Fixing Deafness

- Is deafness addressed without implying that it is something broken that needs to be fixed?
- Is it part of natural human diversity?
- Is deafness celebrated for its language, culture, and community?



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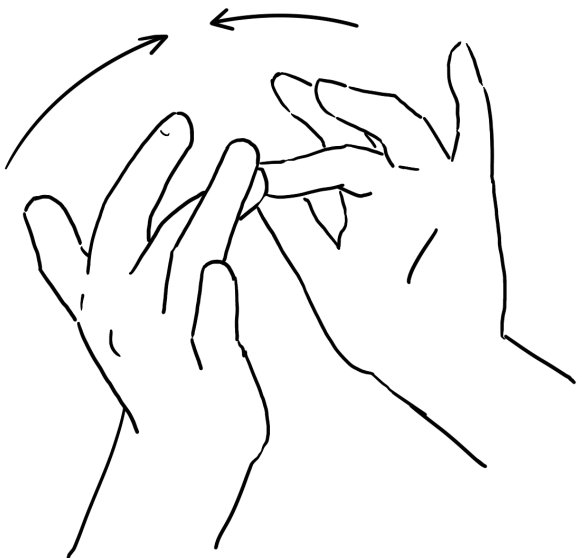
