- A CI team can be a driver of improvement, as early detection and intervention is necessary for optimal CI outcomes
- A successful CI program requires interaction between healthcare providers and parents, schools, and state agencies.
- The multidisciplinary team helps families identify communication goals for their children



The Multidisciplinary Team Approach

Key Professionals Involved

- Surgeon: Performs the implantation surgery
- Audiologist: Assesses hearing and provides CI support
- Speech-Language Pathologist: Focuses on language development
- Psychologist: Supports emotional and psychological adjustment
- Coordinator: Manages communication and logistics for the team and family .

Professionals As Needed

- Social Worker: Supports the family in navigating resources, financial issues, and emotional challenges
- Child-Life Specialist: Eases stress and supports children through medical procedures
- Geneticist: Investigates potential genetic causes and provides guidance on family planning
- Educators: Assists with school integration and educational strategies
- Ophthalmology: Assesses and manages vision issues .
- Neurology: Evaluates and manages neurological factors
- **Developmental Pediatrics: Assesses overall development**

Goal: Comprehensive, individualized care for each child with hearing differences.



CI Team Coordinator


- Manages patient care

- Communicates with patient families
- Ensures timely execution of care
- Spearheads process improvement
- Facilitates communication and coordination among team members



Unique Model: The Role of the Parent-Coordinator

Program Coordinator

- Brings personal insight into the family's journey
- Brings family perspective into decisions and strategies
- Fosters trust and empathy within families
- Enhances communication between the professional team and families
- Supports the family journey
- Creates bridges between the healthcare team and community organizations.



Connecting Families to Resources

Resource Accessibility

- Offer guidance in exploring educational opportunities
- Provide resources on diverse communication options (oral, sign language, AAC, etc.)
- Connect to outside resources



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Community Engagement & Support Networks





- Build a supportive community • with active engagement
- Strengthen connections between families, professionals, and local networks
- Foster a sense of belonging and shared experience
- Host events including workshops, toddler groups, social events














Practical Strategies for Implementing this Model
