

#### **Families of Children Who are D/HH Today**

- 90+ percent of children identified with hearing loss are born to hearing parents
- Every family is unique
  - Language/s spoken or used in the home
  - Learning style
  - Social Determinates of Health
- Variable access to pediatric audiology and EI services

- What to do now to support listening, language, and literacy development




#### How Are Families Learning in 2025?





#### **Goals of First LSL Lessons**





## **Strengthen Parent Observation Skills**

#### What Do You Notice?

What you observe matters! Take note of what your baby is doing as you have conversations together and share it with your LSL interventionist and team.

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When you tune in to your baby first before you start a conversation, what do you notice?



When you pause and wait during a conversation, what does your baby do to take a turn?



Notice any sounds your baby makes during your conversations. They may try to imitate your pitch or speech pattern.

If you whisper to your baby, what do you notice?

## Language in Daily Life


#### Your everyday routines are already in place, ready to help your little one learn to listen and talk!

In the early months after your baby gets their hearing devices, it can feel like there's a lot to learn. Many families want to know what they can do during the day to support their baby's listening and spoken language development.



#### YOU are your baby's first and most important teacher!

The things you're already doing – talking, reading, singing, and playing – are building your little learner's brain each moment. The best part? You don't need to make extra, separate time to talk, read, sing, and play with your baby. All this wonderful language building happens during the routines and everyday moments you already share with your little one!

#### Your baby's routines are filled with rich language opportunities.

Each family has their own unique rhythms and routines. And each interaction you have with your baby is part of their routine.

#### Most daily routines fit into three categories:

- **1 Daily routines** like putting on your baby's hearing aids, feeding, reading, and getting them dressed
- **2** Play routines like singing songs, playing with favorite toys, and peek-a-boo
- **3** Social routines like going to the store, meeting friends, and visiting family

Each routine offers limitless opportunities to talk with your baby and grow their brain for listening and language.


