

# MEET OUR FAMILIES






### OUR JENNA






## NICOLE & BEAU

### MINDY & BOYS


(KENNY, MICHAEL & AARON)

# THE IMPACT AND BENEFIT OF FAMILY CONNECTIONS

IN THE WORDS OF FAMILIES



You can support one another emotionally, share resources and experiences, and spend time together.

I only know one other family personally, but it's nice to know you aren't alone

The benefit of connecting with other is you get emotional support.

It just helps validate me and my feelings and struggles. It's just so nice to not feel alone!

Other parents can tell you things that the doctors don't tell you or forget to say!

We can relate on a whole different and deeper level!

It's just nice sharing experiences with other families that understand

I don't feel alone! We learn from each other, share supprt and work together to make positive changes.

Connecting with families has been such a support in so many ways, from answering questions I had, or suggesting things that helped my son, seeing the success of older children, getting to know the community as a whole and knowing people who have been where I was.

Support, both emotional and practical...ideas, insurance questions, communication options, IEP help, friendships, help and support for siblings

It was a game changer for me. I had no experience with hearing loss. The other moms would know the questions that I didn't know to ask and what next steps would be. They empowered me to be able to advocate for my daughter.

# ADVICE FROM FAMILIES

WHAT THEY WANT PROVIDERS TO KNOW

Explain everything!

Provide literature to explain next steps

Know who you are talking to - respect our culture

Provide information concerning the diagnosis in writing

• Engage families in a straightforward, positive manner

Communicate with understanding and empathy, not pity

 It's a huge diagnosis to process and can cause many emotions, but let them know there is a huge amount of help and support available.

• It can be intimidating to reach out for support when you're overwhelmed, offer to share their contact information with other parents or support organization so they can make the first move.


