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

Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

The **Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence** honors the career achievements of Dr. Antonia Brancia Maxon in promoting effective EHDI programs for all newborns, infants, and young children. Dr. Maxon was a visionary in EHDI programs, beginning with her leadership in the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Project in the late 1980's. She was one of the first to recognize the feasibility and value of universal newborn hearing screening and was a tireless advocate for connecting screening programs with timely and appropriate diagnosis and early intervention.

Her extensive contributions to creating excellent EHDI programs were abruptly ended by a tragic automobile accident in May of 2007. In memory of her contributions, an **Award for EHDI Excellence** is presented at the EHDI Annual Conference to honor an individual or group of people who have made a noteworthy accomplishment that contributed to achieving excellence in EHDI programs nationally or in a particular state or region of the country.

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Blueprint for Change: The Role of EHDI in a Well-Functioning System of Services for CYSHCN

In partnership with families, healthcare professionals, and other experts in the field, the Division of Services for Children with Special Health Needs (DSCSHN) developed the Blueprint for Change: A National Framework for a System of Services for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs. The Blueprint provides a framework to help every child get what they need so they can play, go to school, and grow up to be healthy adults. This presentation will highlight how the work of Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) programs can improve quality of life for every young child who is D/HH and their families by contributing to a well-functioning system of services for CYSHCN.



Jeff Brosco


Dr. Brosco is a historian and pediatrician who serves as the Director for the Division of Services for Children with Special Health Needs at the Health Resources and Services Administration's Maternal and Child Health Bureau.

Dr. Brosco continues to teach and practice general pediatrics and developmental-behavioral pediatrics at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine. He directed the MCHB-funded Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LEND) training program at the Mailman Center for Child Development from 2010 to 2022. He has also served as Director, Population Health Ethics, at UM's Institute for Bioethics and Health Policy,

and as Associate Chair, Population Health, for UM's Department of Pediatrics. Dr. Brosco's research focuses on history, policy, and ethics regarding child health and disability; he has authored 50 peer review publications and over 90 other publications.

For over two decades, Dr. Brosco has held a series of leadership positions for the Florida Department of Health's Children's Medical Services (CMS), which seeks to improve the health of children with special health care needs. From 2017-19 he was Florida's Deputy Secretary of Health for CMS, and stepped down in 2022 after 4 years as the state's Title V Director for CSHCN. Dr. Brosco has also been active in national health policy groups, such as the Advisory Committee on Heritable Disorders in Newborns and Children and the National Workgroup on Standards for Systems of Care for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs. In 2019 he was awarded a Maternal and Child Health Bureau Director's Award for noteworthy national level contributions to the health of infants, mothers, children, adolescents, and children with special health care needs.

Family Empowerment: A Systemic Approach

How can systems empower early interventionists to empower families in the days and months after newborn hearing screening? Utilizing a systemic approach that honors the diversity in families, ideas will be shared on developing a process of earlyintervention that prioritizes early language development that begins with parent/child attachment. The presenter will share strategies for developing a statewide system of supports, exploration of language and communication opportunities, and ensuring parents have opportunities to meet other parents and deaf and hard of hearing adults. This systemic approach empowers families to recognize the importance of early attachment while moving through the process of early decision-making with the support and guidance of other parents of DHH children, Deaf and hard of hearing adults and early intervention specialists, audiologists, and pediatricians.



Karen Hopkins

Karen Hopkins is the Executive Director of The Maine Educational Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing/Governor Baxter School for the Deaf and the principal investigator of Maine's HRSA grant. She brings over 30 years of experience as a collaborative teacher of the deaf, special educator, early interventionist and educational administrator to her work with Deaf and hard of hearing children. Her work with families, coupled with her own personal experience as a Deaf adult and parent of a daughter who is hard of hearing have inspired her to create systems that empower families. Ms. Hopkins oversees early intervention and statewide educational programming for children who are Deaf or hard of hearing birth to age 22 throughout the state

of Maine. She is active in many organizations and boards in Maine, the Hands & Voices HQ Board of Directors and is involved with international FCEI programming including the Deaf Leadership International Alliance. Her current research is focused on perspectives of family empowerment in early intervention systems for Deaf and hard of hearing children.



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Get Their Vision Tested, Too!







*Visual development in the early years is ongoing, and a problem can develop later that was not initially identified.

Deaf and hard of hearing children are highly dependent on their vision.* But what happens when a child can't rely on their vision because it's reduced, distorted, or missing?

Combined hearing and vision loss creates a unique disability-deafblindness-which impacts how a child accesses, understands, and interacts with the world.

Why Test the Vision of a Child Who Is D/HH?

Early identification of deafblindness activates critical referral efforts. A child who is deafblind requires

- A team of specially-trained providers and support staff who understand how children who are deafblind learn and communicate
- Educational strategies different from those of a child who is D/HH or one who is blind/visually impaired
- Referral to specialists who can determine the degree and severity of vision and hearing loss and the presence or absence of additional disabilities
- Individualized support services designed to address the child's unique needs and abilities
- Environments and technology that provide access to information and learning

Any infant or toddler who is identified as D/HH should have their vision tested right away.


